Strip Mining in Sylmar Area Underway

A motion introduced by Councilmember Richard Alarcon on August 19, 2011, in opposition to the mining project states: "As the Lead Agency, the County Regional Planning Staff determined that the review period for the Notice of Preparation (NOP) would be from April 11, 2007 to May 11, 2007. Since that time, the County Department of Regional Planning has not moved forward with the required State mandated environmental review process. It has not held a scoping meeting or any public meetings with public agencies, city staff, neighborhood organizations, private organizations, environmental organizations or city residents."

Alarcon has asked that all relevant departments assist him in finding possible actions the City can take to oppose the mining operation. The project, located just across from L.A. City Limit is actually located in Supervisor Michael Antonovich's district, yet the people most impacted are in the City within Alarcon's and County Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky's districts. There is presently no date selected by the Los Angeles City Council to vote on this Motion. However, Councilmember Paul Krekorian's office says, "The motion has been referred to the Information, Technology and Government Affairs Committee, chaired by Councilmember Tony Cardenas."

During late summer 2010, Sakaida & Sons Trucking began grading the roads throughout the project without a permit for the work. A November 17, 2010 inspection of the property revealed, "Violations of the Los Angeles County Building Code (Title 26)." The violations consist of grading without benefit of a permit, which is a violation of Section J103.1 of the Building Code. But it was not until May 3, 2011 that the County of Los Angeles Public Works Department issued a Notice of Violation for the alleged grading.

The violation has not been cured at this writing. Just days later, Alarcon sent a letter to Sakaida expressing his concerns upon Sakaida's failure to inform him of the mining operation, and asked that he be apprised on the status of the project so that his staff could coordinate concerns from the community.

According to the NOP filed in April 2007, Sakaida & Sons Surface Mining Project would operate a mining operation on 24.8 acres of a 73-acre site. Sakaida plans to remove 3 million cubic yards of sand and gravel, proposing use of Maclay and Hubbard Streets to transport 230 dump truck loads per day of the mined material through residential areas and I-210 over a seven-year period.

The location of the site is south of the Pacoima Dam and east of Pacoima Canyon Rd. in Sylmar. Page 12 of the NOP provides a partial list of the potentially significant impacts that the community and surrounding area could face, including earthquake induced landslides and liquefaction, where saturated dirt substantially

loses strength and stiffness under stress conditions, causing the dirt to behave like a liquid. Flooding, high erosion and debris deposition from run-off along with obnoxious odors, dust, hazardous emissions, noise from heavy equipment, fire hazards, traffic/access, hindrance of emergency response times, raise tremendous concerns for residents who live very close to the site. In addition, the site is not designated as a mineral resource area.

The mining operation and processing plant at the site will consist of: 2 ea. bull-dozers, 4 ea. front-end loaders, 2 ea. processing and conveyor systems and crushers, up to 7ea. generators both rated at 250 horsepower, a self-contained portable processing plant, 2 ea. above ground fuel tanks, an Administration office, a scale house, portable restrooms, water supply trucks, tanks and mined material will be stored in huge stockpiles on the site.

Truck Driver School Nixed by Superior Court

L.A. City Council votes NO appeal

On August 9, 2011, the Los Angeles City Council voted to accept the Court ruling in Community Alliance for Open Space v. City of Los Angeles, et al. They instructed the city attorney not to appeal the Superior Court ruling that decided the fate of city council member Richard Alarcon's Teamsters Joint Council 42/ El Proyecto del Barrio backed project.

On May 17, 2011, the California Superior Court upheld a Writ of Mandate against the City of Los Angeles,



for the approval of a Truck Driving School in Lopez Canyon. The Community Alliance For Open Space (CAFOS) sought to reverse the Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) citing violations of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and approval of a variance that violated applicable zoning laws.

The lawsuit alleged, "The MND is legally insufficient for the City Planning Department to use as the environmental clearance document for the approval of the variance. And, even if a variance granted by one City Department to another were proper, there is no substantial evidence in the record establishing that the proposed diesel semi truck driving school can meet any of the variance test requirements of the City Charter."

In 2008, Alarcon reneged on his promise and earmarked \$100,000.00 to underwrite the relocation of a Truck Driver Training program from Long Beach to Lopez Canyon landfill in Lake View Terrace where the funds originated as community mitigation money in the 1990s.

Several organizations and Neighborhood Councils opposed the project citing Alarcon's 1996 promise to restore the property to "its original gem"- open space. L.A. County Supervisor Michael Antonovich added his voice to those expressing concerns that the trucking school was initiated without proper clearance under CEQA. He persuaded the entire Board of Su-

pervisors to reject the plan as well.

El Proyecto del Barrio, a not-for-profit organization, would have paid the sum of \$1.00 per year to lease the property from the City for a period of five years.

In her decision, Superior Court Judge Ann I. Jones noted, "In this case, as a matter of law, there is a fair argument sufficient to trigger preparation of an Environmental Impact Report (EIR). As noted by the Chief Executive Officer of the County of Los Angeles, the MND failed to properly identify the baseline or the existing conditions at the landfill against which the significance of the environmental impacts of the training academy project could be properly measured."

The City Charter, Section 562, forbids the use of a variance for "special privilege". Sec. 562 states in pertinent part, "A variance shall not be used to grant a special privilege or to permit a use substantially inconsistent with the limitations upon other properties in the same zone and vicinity."

Marlene Rader, Chair of CAFOS, said, "We have fought for almost four years against the City that was intent on breaking its own laws. We invested our own time and hard earned money towards this and are elated with the Court's decision. The sole motivation of Mayor Villaraigosa and Alarcon was to give special

The City Council on, August 16, unanimously approved my four motions aimed at increasing neighborhood council accountability and effectiveness, establishing a path to greater self-governance and im-

proving grassroots participation.

The approval was an important step forward in our continued effort to help strengthen and reform the neigh-

borhood council system - a task I take very seriously as your councilmember and Chairman of the Education and Neighborhoods Committee.

These reforms are by no means limited to my personal vision but are rather the product of tremendous collaboration of stakeholders throughout the city and will advance our on going conversation about enhancing grassroots governance.

The four motions deal with (i) improved training for neighborhood council board members, (ii) reforms in the neighborhood council funding program, (iii) a restructuring of managerial responsibilities from the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment to regional collaborations of neighborhood councils, and (iv) a streamlined process to handle grievances in order to maintain the integrity of the system.

This is by no means a stopping point. Going forward, I will continue working with the city's Neighborhood Councils and the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment to improve local Democracy throughout our communities

Sylmar residents in the "sphere of influence" have formed an organization, Citizens Against Strip Mining in the San Fernando Valley (CASM-SFV) and are reaching out to other communities such as Pasadena, Malibu and Long Beach as well as the entire San Fernando Valley in order to make them aware that a strip mine with it's environmental time bombs has no place this close to mass people.

Ellie Brooks, Chair of CASM-SFV, said, "Our concern is, if one owner gets an okay to strip mine, it will set

a precedent for other sites across the northern edge of valley. We are in a high fire hazard area and we worry about fire protection. There is only one Los Angeles City Fire Department house in all of Sylmar with 90,000 plus residents, as densification will continue to be approved by the city. One of our concerns about the Environmental Impact Review (EIR) process is that endangered species, like birds, carry more weight and consideration than children, or residents, who may suffer from asthma or respiratory disease will be impacted by air pollution. Who knows what type of debris in the mountain will be brought down,

or the amount of exposure to diesel particles. This project is just much too close to our residential area; it surely will negatively impact our health and our quality of life."

The Notice of Preparation claims, after 7 years, the site will be used as a nursery. One resident remarked, "A similar project by the same owner didn't last long as a nursery before he filed paperwork to convert it into a subdivision. Historically, gravel quarries like this also have a high probability of being expanded."

privileges to Transportation Opportunities Program (TOPS) to operate a truck driving school on land designated as open space. This has NEVER been an issue of jobs or the training of truck drivers; it has always been an issue of land use (period). This ruling sets a precedent to protect open space."

Alarcon told sources that he hoped the Court would have allowed them to do a "few fixes" to the MND and expressed his regret that those who desired training would not get it now. Alarcon's office, however, did not respond to the North Valley Reporter's requests for comments.

While the truck driving school is "dead on arrival", the Bureau of Sanitation (BoS) will continue to submit ideas on how to utilize Lopez Canyon. One idea that gained a little traction was the adding of food waste into compost piles. Residents who attended that BoS meeting called Cal Recycle with concerns of seagulls, vermin and noxious odors that would result if BoS were to implement such a plan.

At the Foothill Trails District Neighborhood Council (FTDNC) general meeting in July, The group expressed concerned regarding the removal of the doublewide trailer for school from the landfill. Also, the Board voted

unanimously to strongly recommend that Alarcon submit a Motion to use the Amenities Fund to install hiking and equestrian trails, as originally promised, for the Lopez Canyon Landfill because BoS had already said there were no funds to pay for the trails project at the landfill.

A meeting for the Lopez Canyon Restoration Project is scheduled for Wednesday September 7, 2011 at the Lopez Canyon Landfill 11950 Lopez Canyon Rd. Lakeview Terrace. RSVP must be made by September 2, 2011 to Reva Fabricant toll free at 1-866-950-7382.



What to Do During an Excessive Heat Watch:

Excessive heat is when a prolonged period of hot temperatures are expected. The combination of hot temperatures and high humidity can create dangerous heat related illnesses

The City of Los Angeles facilities are utilized as cooling centers. A list of these facilities is available at emergency.lacity.org. Click on the banner that says "Cooling Facilities to beat the heat."

These facilities include Senior Citizen Centers, Recreation and Parks facilities, and Libraries. Hours vary by facility, and you can check with the facility for their current hours of operation. During excessive heat there is an increased risk of unhealthy air quality, heat exhaustion, heat cramps and sunstroke. People should take the necessary precautions and limit outdoor activities.

Residents who require power to run medical or other life saving equipment - contact DWP's Customer Service Line at 1-800-DIALDWP for more information about their Lifeline Services Program, or visit the Pub-Health http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/. The following tips to use during excessive heat are offered by the DWP: 1) Turn off lights when not in use. 2) Adjust thermostat to 78 degrees to reduce energy usage. 3) Limit the use of appliances during peak hours of the day—use washing machines, dishwashers, vacuum cleaners and other heavy appliances during evening hours. 4) Avoid cooking during peak hours of the day. 5) Ventilate your home at night, opening windows and doors to clear out the heat and allow cooler air to circulate.

During those periods, there is an increased risk of heat exhaustion, heat cramps and sunstroke. Note the following tips: 1) Stay indoors as much as possible and limit exposure to the sun. 2) Stay on the lowest floor out

of the sunshine if air conditioning is not available. 3) Spend the warmest part of the day in public buildings such as libraries, schools, movie theaters, shopping malls, and other community facilities. Circulating air can cool the body by increasing the perspiration rate of evaporation. 4) Eat well-balanced, light, and regular meals. Avoid using salt tablets unless directed to do so by a physician. 5) Drink plenty of water. Persons who have epilepsy or heart, kidney, or liver disease; are on fluid-restricted diets; or have a problem with fluid retention should consult a doctor before increasing liquid intake. 6) Limit intake of alcoholic beverages. 7) Dress in loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothes that cover as much skin as possible. 8) Protect face and head by wearing a wide-brimmed hat. 9) Check on family, seniors, friends, and neighbors who do not have air conditioning and who spend much of their time alone. 10) Never leave children or pets alone in closed vehicles. 11) Avoid strenuous work during the warmest part of the day. 11) Use a buddy system when working in extreme heat, and take frequent breaks.

Never leave children, the elderly or pets in enclosed automobiles, even for a short period of time. Even if the windows are partially open, temperatures can quickly rise to life-threatening levels. Neighborhood Councils Need to Take the Lead

Scorned at every turn by a City Hall political machine that fears community empowerment, Neighborhood Councils still remain the only real hope to bring about reform and a balance of interests to Los Angeles.

NCs were created as part of Charter reform more than a decade ago as a means of heading off San Fernando Valley secession – a powerless sop to the beleaguered middle class that had been fleeing the city for suburbs with better schools, safer streets, and more economic opportunity.

Still, with Greg Nelson, former chief of staff to Councilman Joel Wachs, who had fought power sharing as the first head of the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, dozens of NCs were established. Hundreds of people got their first taste of civic engagement and what City Hall was up to.

Resistance from elected officials was unrelenting from the outset and has never let up, with DONE now drastically downsized and funding sharply reduced.

"The city establishment has no use for the NCs or any other meaningful source of public input," Nelson is quoted as saying in an article in the quarterly City Journal by Joel Kotkin, social critic and urban issues expert. http://www.city-journal.org/2011/21_3_losangeles.html

The article is a scathing indictment of L.A.'s leadership in recent decades, carrying the headline "Lost Angeles: The City of Angels goes to hell."

As discouraging as the city's plight is, Kotkin holds out hope for a "Sunshine Revolution" that will bring down the City Hall political machine and free "this diverse and dynamic region (to) resume its ascent toward greatness."

For his part, Greg Nelson says: "If just one leader comes along, NCs could emerge into a major force."

The bizarre end to Al Abrams role as a leading – if conflicted – voice in the Neighborhood Council movement creates an opportunity for the thousands of people who have gotten involved in NCs in the last decade to seize the day and begin the process of real reform.

Abrams, a public relations and political consultant appointed by Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa to be president of the board overseeing the Department of Neighborhood

Empowerment, was forced to resign after the FBI seized computers and other material from his Tarzana home as part of a child pornography investigation.

For starters, the NCs need to demand that the open seat on the DONE Commission be filled by their appointee and then the various NC alliances need to hold a summit to nominate their candidate and articulate an agenda that will give life to the idea of neighborhood empowerment.

City officials understand ultimatums as they showed in delivering AEG's Tim Leiweke everything he demanded for the football stadium proposal.

If NCs ever want to be more than talking societies, they need to step up now and become a force to be reckoned with.

City Hall and the special interests that control it will not give up power out of the goodness of their hearts. Power must be taken and NCs could do it if they band together and find the courage to fight for what is good for the neighborhoods and the city as a whole.

L.A.'s City Bus Bench Program & New Retaining Wall Ordinance

The LA City Council voted to approve a Bus Bench Program August 19, 2011 that includes amending language proposed by Councilmember Bill Rosendahl. The amendment incorporates zoning restrictions into the proposed Bus Bench contract with Martin Outdoor Media, a Florida company. It reads: "the proposed contract to require that new bus benches with advertising be installed in a manner that is consistent with all local zoning codes, including restrictions on off-site advertising set forth in the General Plan, Community Plans, Specific Plans as enacted by ordinance, the California Coastal Act, and all other applicable law."

The Bus Bench Program authorizes the placement of thousands of new benches with commercial advertising throughout the City. The City Council passed the Bus Bench Ordinance with the Rosendahl Amendment by a vote of 11-1 and represents an important first step in controlling the proliferation of Bus Bench advertising in scenic and historic areas.

Look for an effort to reach out to communities throughout the City for areas subject to zoning prohibitions and restrictions on advertising signage, including Scenic Highways, Corridors and Parkways, Specific Plan protected areas, Coastal Zones, Streetscapes, and other areas protected under the law. This Bus Bench Program is far from the only advertising-related ordinance on the City's agenda.

The proposed City-Wide Sign Ordinance and the Sign Banner Program could threaten our scenic and historic areas, despite zoning prohibitions on such signage. The next hearing regarding the City-Wide Sign Ordinance will be on Tuesday, October 18, 2011 at 2 p.m. with the City Council's Planning and Land Use Management Committee.

Retaining Walls - David Olivo from the LA City Planning Department held a meeting On August 23, with neighbors in the North Valley, regarding an upcoming revision to the City of L.A. Retaining Wall Ordinance. The planner was very impressed with the feedback he received from the North Valley. Some of the comments included: The ordinance needs to show accurate measuring guide and that the planners should know how to measure a footing and wall. Example: If a garden wall needs a 24" footing then the wall will only be one foot above the ground. What defines a retaining wall? What is the maximum retaining wall height? Include standards for walls that don't have a public view vs. street view. Define discretionary, terraced walls, aesthetically pleasing, enforcement, and compliance. What is finish grade vs. natural grade? What will be the length and height of the walls, types of walls, open or crib walls, contiguous walls? 












Tis the Season!
